Geography: Teacher Led

1. Read, annotate, and take notes that help you answer the guiding question.
2. Plot the locations, places, regions, human-environment interactions, and movements of goods and ideas.
3. Create a DETAILED LEGEND or KEY with icons.
4. Title your map including type and dates.
5. Use what you learned from thinking like a geographer to answer the guiding question.



Journalism: Independent
